Minutes of the meeting, February 15th 1999

The meeting was called to order by President John, KC8AOX at 19:45, roll call was taken and sign-in sheet passed around, there were 20 NOARS members present.

Minutes were read by N8PZD, motion to accept after correction that Ken presented advanced skywarn training not Rich, by WD8IOU, 2nd by KG8VU.

Treasurer Report read by KC8AOX, motion to accept by KG8VU, 2nd by N8VUB

Committee Reports;

Newsletter, Clark N8PZD also secretary, hopes to do as well as previous editors, his computer background should help us with this important task. Submissions may be e-mailed or sent through postal handlers or pass info to him at club meetings.

DX, Tedd reported a new country Palestine, listen for E4 prefix

Nets, KC8AOX took Harry KA8ZDW to the site to evaluate 444.800 and found the low voltage section of the power supply failed after being in service about 12 years, the original builder of the controller W8PEV was present and surprised his handywork had endured the trails of time so well. The rectifier components have also been replaced and 444.800 is in service at this writing.

Field Day, NOARS took 3d in 5A-OH in 1998 in spite of very rough weather, help is needed to keep Field Day going strong, Clark is limited this year.

Banquet, Rosemary read Tom's note from the Bird Company which said the donated Model 43 wattmeter program had dissolved and contact made by Dave N8DW had produced nothing, this resulted in the club being billed 325.00 for the purchase of the unit given away as advertised. Motion was made by KB8NW and 2nd by WD8IOU to purchase the meter, vote was taken and passed unanimous. A brief discussion of club finances followed and recommendations were made to create a fiscal calendar from July to July to permit easier tracking of the budget.

Contesting, VHF activity was carried by N8OSM who made contacts on 6 and 2 and will try to submit logs.

Hamfests, Winterfest 99 report is elsewhere in this issue, planning for Noarsfest has begun with the fairgrounds, each vendor's worker needs to obtain admission ticket in addition to space costs.

USS Cod, Fred and Clark reported the forward torpedo tube had sprung a leak, the Cod Committee had calculated less than 1 quart per hour, the leak had been pacified till further repairs can be made in desirable climate. Fred advised us that in April there will be another submarine radio re-activation net and asked for help in the radio operating room.

New Business, with the budget discussion came the request for a proposed annual budget to be presented to the club's membership, also the discussion to change the fiscal year start-stop in July was tabled for March meeting.

W8EU proposed the club purchase a digital voice chip for the controller serving the Elyria FM repeaters, KC8AOX and KB8VKF both mentioned that the software pack had grown obsolete and an update for that must be purchased before the end of 1999, W8EU made motion and KG8VU 2nd, vote was taken to purchase 280.00 US / 10 yes – 2 no.

Upcoming Events, Wednesday March 10th the statewide emergency disaster drill, KG8VU informed us last year this tornado ruined all forms of wire communications, the hams were ready and standing by, over 26 operators checked in from various areas

Friday March 19th NWS Advanced Training seminar, Elyria Red Cross bldg. – KC8BQO has details. There will be experimental operations on 5 MHz band to test for allocating the Amateur Radio service more spectrum.

Radio amateurs around the world joined in mourning the death over the weekend of Jordan's King Hussein, JY1. Hussein, 63, died Sunday morning. The Middle East's longest-reigning ruler, he'd been Jordan's king for 47 years, taking the throne when he was just a teenager. His son, Abdullah, 37, succeeds him

Hussein had earned a reputation as a catalyst for peace and as a conciliator in the Middle East. President Clinton is among the

heads of state from around the globe gathered in Jordan today for King Hussein's funeral.

Hussein was a life member of the ARRL. ARRL Executive Vice President David Sumner, K1ZZ, called him "an enthusiastic radio amateur whose support was invaluable to us in obtaining new amateur bands at the 1979 World Administrative Radio Conference." Sumner recalled that in May 1979, International Amateur Radio Union President Noel Eaton, VE3CJ, was invited to Amman to meet with King Hussein.

"Jordan's support of the Amateur Service was much in evidence at the conference that fall, and was a crucial element in our success," Sumner said. The WARC-79 resulted in Amateur Radio's gaining the 30, 17, and 12-meter bands. That same year, JY1 was featured in the film, "The World of Amateur Radio." Hussein regarded his 1983 contact with Owen Garriott, W5LFL, on board the Space Shuttle Columbia, as a high point in his Amateur Radio activity.

King Hussein also participated in the historic 1995 joint Israel-Jordan JY74X operation on Mt Nebo, where hams from both countries participated in a Field Day-like operation. The King put in appearances both on the air and in person, much to the delight of the participants and those waiting to work him and JY74X.

Hussein's friend Bruce "Blackie" Blackburn, W4TA/JY9BB, of St Petersburg, Florida, called him "one of the world's most respected amateurs" and recounted many stories about King Hussein as a person and an avid Amateur Radio operator. "He was a wonderful guy, interested in everything and everyone," he said.

Blackburn said King Hussein "promoted Amateur Radio to the hilt in Jordan" and saw to it that Amateur Radio classes were instituted in elementary schools. King Hussein also dropped in on meetings of the Royal Jordan Radio Amateur Society in Amman. King Hussein also was involved with the early satellite experiments.

Hussein had been active in recent months from the US while seeking cancer treatment at Minnesota's Mayo Clinic. A QSO with JY1 was considered by many hams to be both an honor and a privilege. His elegant QSL card was prized. AMSAT Area Coordinator Bruce Paige, KK5DO, in Houston, worked JY1 while the king was in the US last summer. "That was a very exciting moment for me," he said.

Pat Kilroy, WD8LAQ, says he enjoyed a three-minute contact on 20 meters with King Hussein in the fall of 1995. "JY1 was traveling aeronautical mobile, enroute to the United Nations. He insisted on me addressing him simply as 'Hussein'," he said. "In one of the oldest traditions in Amateur Radio, Hussein

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upheld that this kinship transverses not only age and nationality, but also between citizen and head of state.

All members of the Jordanian royal family automatically have Amateur Radio privileges in Jordan. Although the new king does not appear to have a call sign, King Hussein's widow--the American-born Queen Noor--is JY1NH. King Hussein's brother, the former Crown Prince Hassan, is JY2HT, while his cousin, Prince Raad, JY2RZ, is chairman of the Royal Jordan Radio Amateur Society.

Subj: Remote antenna switches

In response to my query about experience with remote antenna switches, I received about 20 comments. The most surprising thing about them is that VERY few people had problems with their antenna switches, and all of them were generally satisfied with the ones they had chosen. To the extent there were negatives, they had to do with deficiencies in design "seen from afar." Generally, where people were using a given unit, they acknowledged the shortcomings but had successfully worked around them and felt that the units worked well regardless.

The largest number were using the Ameritron RCS-8V. They acknowledged the relatively poor quality enclosures, but reported long trouble-free service. Several people were using the RCS-4, which does not require a control cable - the clear low-cost winner overall.

Next was DX Engineering -- high marks on both electrical and mechanical construction, but acknowledged to be a little more expensive than the Ameritrons.

A number of people praised Top Ten Devices, particularly for their flexibility, while noting the need for a weatherproof enclosure because the relay boxes are designed for indoor use. They also got loud applause for their customer service.

Two liked the switches from Antenna Mart of Iowa.

And finally, a couple of different solutions -- one urged the use of something called a "globe" - a multiposition motorized coax switch, available surplus-- while two encouraged me to build my own.

So that's the story - I hope you find it useful.

IMO the best antenna switch is a multiposition motor driven surplus switch usually made by Transco, TRW or the like. They often are called "globes" because of their shape. Usually a cylinder (containing the motor) with the connectors (usually N's) at one end and a military type connector to take power. You need to make a 28v (or so) power supply with a switch to apply voltage to the right port to make the motor step but this is not difficult to do. These switches should handle any reasonable amateur power at HF, are essentially lossless (they work some of them to several GHz) and very rugged. I have left them outside in the weather and that is o.k. but I would rather put them in some kind of enclosure. These

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switches are surplus and readily available at any flea market almost always for less than \$50 and sometimes half that. They have anywhere from 2 to 8 ports. If you don't have a 28v supply (at about 1-2 amps peak to start the motor), you can get 23v from an Astron 13.8v supply by tapping off the unregulated DC output at the filter before it goes into the regulator. These relays will turn readily at less than 20v. This is an alternative to an expensive ham type remote switch. Those are fine but cost plenty of dough.

These are available by order from the Dorman catalog at most automotive parts stores. They are on page 15-2 of the 1992 Dorman catalog, and cost in the range of \$2 to \$3. These clamps are plated steel but not galvanized, and seem to last reasonably well in the weather. They come packed one to a box with nuts, but I use them with plated washers and elastic stop nuts ("Nylock").
