STS-93 IS A SAREX SUCCESS!

Shuttle Columbia mission STS-93 was an Amateur Radio success story. During the short mission, crew members completed Space Amateur Radio EXperiment contacts with five schools plus a contact with the cosmonauts aboard the Russian Mir space station. STS-93 returned to Earth July 27.

Launched July 23, STS-93 marked the 25th time the SAREX payload has flown on a shuttle mission. It also likely will be the last SAREX shuttle mission as future ham radio efforts in space will focus on the Amateur Radio on the International Space Station--or ARISS--project.

With deepest regrets we report the sudden passing of Dave Willemin N8DW on July 28th.

Dave was surely a radio enthusiast who chased a lot of DX and understood solving many electronic problems, he will be missed by all of us. Our condolences to the Willemin Family who was taken by surprise when an apparent heart attack struck while he was golfing.

MORE STATES JUMP ON PROCLAMATION BANDWAGON

And the hits just keep on coming! Alabama GOV Don Siegelman has joined the growing throng to declare the week June 21-27 as Amateur Radio Week. In his declaration, Siegelman acknowledged that Alabama's hams "repeatedly demonstrate their immense value to the citizens of this state by providing emergency communications during natural disasters and other non-weather-related calamities." Alabama Section Manager Bill Cleveland, KR4TZ, expressed his appreciation to the Governor and to State Government Liaison Rik Doll, KU4PY, who helped obtain the declaration.

In Oregon, GOV John Kitzhaber has declared June 26-27 as Amateur Radio Awareness Days in recognition of Field Day and Amateur Radio's contribution to communications "during an earthquake, fire, flood or other disaster" as well as during public service events. The Oregon proclamation singles out the "more than 1000 Oregon member of the Amateur Radio Emergency Service" who provided emergency communication to police and fire agencies during winter floods and to the American Red Cross and forest service agencies during summer fires. The Oregon proclamation resulted from the efforts of a coalition ARES chapters and clubs in Salem, Oregon, called Metro-Salem Teams in Amateur Radio Service (M-STARS). The coalition petitioned for the proclamation from Kitzhaber, according to Mac McGowan, N7REO.

VOLUNTEER FOR THE 13th ANNUAL Pedal To The Point Bike Tour!

August 21st & 22nd, 1999

On August 21st and August 22nd two thousand bicyclists will leave the Cuyahoga County Fairgrounds and pedal seventy-five miles to Sandusky. The daring will even take an additional twenty-five mile loop near the end of the route. On day two a portion of those from day one will return on their bikes while others will return by bus.

This event requires hundreds of volunteers. Ham operators are a vital portion of this event's twelve-year success and *we need a lot of you!* For two twelve hour days we staff rest stops, between rest stops, mobile roaming units, medical units, start/finish locations, sag vehicles, sweep vehicles, etc. over seventy-five miles! You can be a sag vehicle if your vehicle can hold bikes. (Your mileage may be tax deductible too!)

This is one of the largest public service events in Northern Ohio, which relies on our hobby for medical and safety communications. Those who volunteer their time, equipment and expertise will be rewarded! Rest stops along the route are stocked with large amounts of food and drinks. In the evening dinner is available. Those who wish to stay overnight can pitch a tent or sleep in the gym of the Sandusky High School. In the morning pancakes are made in a very unique way you just have to experience. All volunteers are given a Pedal to the Point T-shirt and the opportunity to purchase Cedar Point tickets at a very reduced cost. (Volunteer tickets can be used once at any time in the remaining season). The event takes place rain or shine, hot or cold. – This event is a great exercise in emergency communications.

In Florida, GOV Jeb Bush has proclaimed June as Amateur Radio Month in recognition of Amateur Radio's contributions to emergency communication needs. The proclamation also cites the contribution of hams who engage in "programs of assistance and rehabilitation of the disabled in the development of radio as a hobby."

In North Carolina, GOV James Hunt JR has proclaimed June 20-26 as Amateur Radio Week, noting that hams "are on alert for any emergency, local or worldwide, and practice their communication skills during the Field Day exercise of the American Radio Relay League."

In Mississippi, GOV Kirk Fordice has proclaimed the week of June 20-26 as Amateur Radio Week. The proclamation, obtained through the efforts of Tim Billingsley, KD5CKP, of Olive Branch, says that hams have "demonstrated valuable public assistance" and are "alert and prepared for any emergency, local or worldwide." It also cites Field Day as an emergency preparedness exercise.

A similar Amateur Radio Week proclamation was signed recently by GOV Jeanne Shaheen of New Hampshire. The proclamation cites the memorandum of understanding between the New Hampshire Amateur Radio Association and the Office of Emergency Management to provide backup communications during disaster situations.


