Wounded ham-sailor continues recovery:

Sailboat skipper Bo Altheden, SM7XBH, shot and wounded after pirates attacked his vessel March 20 off Venezuela, continues his recovery in Trinidad. Following the incident, hams on the Maritime Mobile Service Net assisted Altheden and his wife, ViVi-Maj Miren, after Miren put out a call for help on 20 meters. Miren reports that Altheden had to be hospitalized for additional surgery after he developed an infection. The couple plans to fly to Copenhagen later this month. The couple and their 44-foot ketch Lorna were en route to Trinidad and Tobago when pirates--later described by Miren as six men in a fishing boat--pulled along side. Miren said the Lorna will be hauled out and stored in Trinidad for the next six months. "I hope Bo will recover during these months so we can come back and start sailing again," she told Eric Mackie, 9Z4CP, who was among the amateurs assisting in the rescue operation.--Eric Mackie, 9Z4CP

Spectrum Protection bill attracts additional cosponsors:

ARRL Legislative and Public Affairs Manager Steve Mansfield, N1MZA, reports that the House and Senate versions of the Spectrum Protection Act are collecting cosponsors from both sides of the aisle. The House bill, HR 817, introduced by Rep Michael Bilirakis of Florida now has 18 cosponsors including Assistant Majority Whip Doc Hastings of Washington--part of the House Leadership. Other cosponsors include representatives John Baldacci of Maine, Tammy Baldwin of Wisconsin, Dan Burton of Indiana, John Conyers of Michigan, John Doolittle and Gary Miller of California, Virgil Goode of Virginia, Johnny Isakson of Georgia, William Jenkins of Tennessee, Walter Jones and Mike McIntyre of North Carolina, George Nethercutt of Washington, Ted Strickland and Patrick Tiberi of Ohio, Charles Stenholm of Texas, and Lee Terry of Nebraska. The Senate companion bill, S 549, introduced by Sen Michael Crapo of Idaho, currently has five cosponsors. These include senators Daniel Akaka of Hawaii, Susan Collins of Maine, Larry Craig of Idaho, Jesse Helms of North Carolina, and Bob Smith of New Hampshire.

Nevada antenna bill heard in committee:

Nevada Assistant Section Manger Dick Flanagan, W6OLD, reports that Nevada's pending Amateur Radio antenna legislation, Assembly Bill 61, was aired April 30 in a public hearing by the Nevada Senate Government Affairs Committee. "Even though only three people showed up to voice their support of the bill, there was no one in opposition, and the committee members appeared open to our presentations," he said. Flanagan said the committee did not vote on the bill nor was it expected to. The bill's sponsor, Assemblyman Bob Beers, WB7EHN, urged amateurs living in the district of any member of the Senate Government Affairs Committee to e-mail their senators and for club representatives to e-mail committee members on behalf of their organizations. Beers advised against any massive e-mail or letter writing campaigns at this point. Flanagan said all Nevada amateurs can record their opinions via the Legislature Message Center or by telephone or fax. Emergency Service honored by newspaper:

The Central Ohio Amateur Radio Emergency Service has won the Community Service Award from The Columbus Dispatch, Ohio's second-largest daily newspaper. The award--the newspaper's top public service recognition--includes a plaque and \$500. The local ARES group was honored for its participation in more than 60 events annually in Franklin County. Accepting the award was COARES President Bill Carpenter, AA8EY, who's also Franklin County Emergency Coordinator. "When they came to the public service groups, I was more than surprised we had won," said Carpenter, "but the honor goes to the 300 ham radio members who make this award and recognition an actuality for COARES." Carpenter says his team logged more than 6000 hours of events work last year, mostly public service events. "We help area charities raise more than \$1,000,000 annually," he said.

Hamvention reinstates hotel shuttle service:

Dayton Hamvention has contracted with a coach company to provide limited shuttle bus service to and from several area hotels/motels. Shuttles will service the Best Western Motel, 2401 Needmore Road; the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Fifth and Jefferson; Doubletree Inn, Ludlow and Third St; Holiday Inn, Dayton Mall, 31 Prestige Plaza; Dayton Marriott, 1414 S Patterson Blvd; and Ramada Inn South, 3555 Miamisburg-Centerville Rd. The fare will be \$4 per person for round-trip coach service from the hotel/motel parking areas. The fare will be collected on the in-bound trip, and the ticket is good for the day. Coaches will leave each morning to arrive at Hamvention before the show opens. The coaches will return to the hotel/motel locations throughout the day. Bus service also is available to and from Hara Arena from the various satellite parking areas (Salem Mall and Forest Park Shopping Center) and the KOA. There's a \$2 per-person charge for round-trip bus service to and from the satellite parking areas, collected on the in-bound trip and good for the day. Besides the offices he has served, Tom, an Extra class ham who has chaired numerous Dayton Hamvention committees, has been licensed and has been an ARRL member since 1972. A volunteer examiner, Tom is also a member of the Miamisburg Wireless Association. His wife, Barbara, is N8EYW.

DENNIS TITO PHONES HOME VIA HAM RADIO

Having the time of his life aboard the International Space Station, US businessman Dennis Tito, KG6FZX, this week made his first Amateur Radio contacts from his perch in space. Tito arrived aboard the ISS on April 30.

The first "space tourist," Tito spoke May 1 via Amateur Radio with his family as the ISS was passing over Hawaii. The audio was telebridged to the mainland. On May 2, Farrell Winder, W8ZCF, in Cincinnati, reported snagging two contacts with the ISS-the second time chatting with Tito for several minutes. Tito used the NAISS call sign for the contact. He reportedly made a few other contacts this week as well. Winder said Tito told him he loves space and was having a ball. "He said it is the greatest experience of his lifetime, "Winder said. He also said Tito was eager to know what was being discussed about him on Earth. During Tito's visit, the crew of Russian Commander Yury Usachev, UA9AD, and US astronauts Susan Helms, KC7NHZ, and Jim Voss, are undertaking a minimal work routine and maintenance schedule. Winder says he also spoke with Helms during another pass. In a TV interview from space earlier this week, Tito said he was not nervous at all about the launch. He reports suffering some space sickness early on but has begun to get used to weightlessness. "I'll tell you, there is nothing like this as an experience," Tito said. He said the ISS crew welcomed him and gave him a tour of the spacecraft. Tito reportedly will pay Russia a total of some \$20 million for the privilege of going into space. He and two Russian cosmonauts launched April 28 from Kazakhstan on a 10-day Soyuz vehicle taxi mission. NASA initially opposed Tito's visit, but Russia insisted. Last week, NASA relented and agreed to the arrangement under certain conditions. Tito, 60, took and passed the Technician exam earlier this month after a volunteer examination session was set up for him in Russia.

Cleveland and Brecksville Hams Now Subject to Antenna Restrictions ??!! (KG8MR)

It was learned at a LEARA club meeting, that certain "emergency" ordinances were recently passed in both the city of Cleveland and Brecksville restricting new antenna structures. The Cleveland ordinance is generalized to most types of antennas and their usage. However, the Brecksville restrictions specifically lists new amateur radio antennas as being restricted. Furthermore, it was reported the Brecksville restrictions impose a height restriction to about the 4 feet!! (No, this is not my April fools contribution). Generally passage of "emergency actions" in communities, means most individuals (you and me) don't get a chance to be heard, in order for city officials to expedite the action at hand. And, it appears most were left out of this one. It is speculated that these actions were meant to curb the dramatic rise of cellular sites. This is somewhat understandable, but I bet ironically, most city officials use a cell phone - so its a "not in my backyard thing too." Why other types of antennas were included in these restrictions remains a subject of unresolved conflict. After all, ham antennas have been around for the last 50 years! Why suddenly make it an emergency action? I have yet to confirm any of this information from another valid source. (All of this may be inaccurate, but I doubt it. I felt it was a legitimate threat to us all, so I'll take that chance to get the visibility for a growing problem we all face. What good is an HF radio without a decent antenna?) However, given this is an open forum, I would like to start a discussion around this subject matter. If you live in Cleveland and Brecksville are you aware of these actions??? Glenn - KG8MR

3-09-2001 Update to the Antenna restriction saga. Gary NI8Z has obtained a copy of the Brecksville Ordinance in question after a meeting with Bob Miller at the Brecksville Town Hall. He promised to bring it to the March 21st. CARS meeting. If you live in Brecksville, you may want to take a look at it then. In discussing some of the ordinance's wordings, Gary clarified that the ordinance restricts "dish type antennas" to a maximum width of 40 inches. Other types of antennas (ie. amateur radio), were limited to 12 foot above the ridgeline of the home. So, the 4' foot statement reported earlier, is inaccurate. Any antenna structures outside the new guidelines would require a permit to be obtained from the city, with adequate proof of proper planning and installation. A second issue, did present itself in this discussion. It appears the city also included verbeage to address RFI matters. It addresses individuals who cause interference within the city. It states the "city" will issue warnings, and penalties for non-compliance to their guidelines. Hmmm, seems to me, they have overstepped their bounds on this one. I thought this was the FCC's role! Anyways, catch the next meeting, to read it for yourself. 73-Glenn KG8MR


