Technician Class Enhancement

From the ARRL Website:

The FCC has invited public comments on ARRL's 2018
Petition for Rule Making, now designated as RM-11828, which asks the FCC to expand HF privileges for
Technician licensees to include limited phone privileges on 75, 40, and 15 meters, plus RTTY and digital mode privileges on 80, 40, 15, and 10 meters. Interested parties have 30 days to comment. The Technician enhancement proposals stemmed from the recommendations of the ARRL Board of Directors' Entry-Level License Committee, which explored various initiatives and gauged member opinions in 2016 and 2017.

"This action will enhance the available license operating

privileges in what has become the principal entry-level license class in the Amateur Service," ARRL said in its Petition. "It will attract more newcomers to Amateur Radio, it will result in increased retention of licensees who hold Technician Class licenses, and it will provide an improved incentive for entry-level licensees to increase technical self-training and pursue higher license class achievement and development of communications skills."

Smithsonian Institution's NN3SI Returning to the Air

From ARRL News.

The historic NN3SI call sign is being reactivated under the aegis of the Smithsonian Institution Amateur Radio Group. "We do not have a physical station location, and we are not open for guest operation as in the past, but this this is the start to Amateur Radio slowly coming back at the Smithsonian," the group's president, John Weise, N4NPG, told ARRL. "We expect to begin operating holiday style starting in April."

NN3SI will operate mobile and portable from several District of Columbia, Virginia, and Maryland locations on most bands and modes. NN3SI hopes to be on the air for

most contests this year including Rookie Roundup, the ARRL June VHF Contest, and ARRL Field Day, Weise added. As he recounts, NN3SI was initially a temporary "special" call sign granted to the Smithsonian during the US bicentennial in 1976, and the station remained active until 2008 when building renovations left NN3SI without a permanent location. "The call sign lapsed, but was renewed this year," Weise said, "and the new Smithsonian Institution Amateur Radio Group has been organized as a club for Smithsonian staff members, and to provide important emergency management and STEM educational resources to the Smithsonian Institution." — Thanks to John Weise, N4NPG

Tech Savvy

ANTENNA BASICS

Query No. 12

Q. What do the terms dBi and dBd that appear in antenna specifications represent?

A. Antenna manufacturers express the gain of their antennas in decibels, which is based on a comparison with a standard antenna such as a dipole or an isotropic antenna. An isotropic antenna is a theoretical antenna that is infinitely small, is a point located in outer space, is completely removed from anything around it, radiates equal power in all directions and is used as a reference to explain and measure the performance of a practical antenna. Since the isotropic antenna radiates equal power in all directions, it has no directivity. The dipole antenna is similar to the isotropic antenna in that it is located in outer space and is lossless.

Basically, the gain of a practical antenna is equal to its maximum radiation intensity divided by the minimum radiation intensity from a reference antenna, providing both antennas have the same power input. The main lobe of the antenna pattern is

used to measure gain.

When the standard is referenced to an isotropic antenna, the gain is expressed as dBi (dB isotropic). If the standard is referenced to a dipole antenna, the gain is expressed as dBd (dB dipole). The gain of the dipole antenna over an isotropic antenna is 1.64 or 2.15 dB, which can be used to convert dBi to dBd and vice versa. This would be useful for comparing gains of two similar antennas, each with a different dB rating, from different manufacturers. Simply add 2.15 dB to the dBd value to convert to dBi or subtract 2.15 dB from the dBi value to convert to dBd.

It is hoped this brief article explains how the antenna ratings of dBi and dBd were determined and how to convert dBi to dBd and vice versa to compare ratings and costs of similar antenna designs from different manufacturers.

March 18, 2019 NOARS Membership Meeting Minutes

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 PM by the club President, Carl, W8KRF. Twenty-six members and guests were in attendance.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited, followed by roll call by call sign. Jennifer, the new Branch Manager of the library introduced herself and asked about the new room set-up. Everyone agreed that we like it. An audience member asked her if she was a ham, which she is not.

Bill, K8RTR made a motion to suspend reading minutes of the January 2019 meeting minutes, as they are published in the newsletter. Bob, W8RET seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Treasurer's Report - Tom, W8KYZ shared the current balance, which includes the profits from the very successful Winter Hamfest. All bills are paid, including LCCC room rental for the hamfest and phone. Carl related the cable company replaced modem free of charge, which saved the club some money. Tom asked for a motion to accept the report. Al, N8CX did that. Seconded by Dave, W8KFJ. Motion passed. Tom reviewed the financials from the Winter Hamfest. Expenses were low, due in part to donation of two 20 meter antennas by Jack Nilsson, K8NDL, saving the club over \$100 in prizes. Self-serve table profits were greater than past years and 50/50 was successful. Dan, W8AJF was thanked for his work on the 50/50. Admissions, table rentals, and club membership renewals were reviewed. It was the largest profit in many years. An audience member asked if W1PDI was paid for banners and signs. Answer was no, Tom did everything free-ofcharge. He also was responsible for the increased advertising of the event. Attendance was up. A certificate of appreciation was suggested. All agreed Tom needs recognition for the excellent work he has done. Bill, K8RTR, related there were 55 check-ins. Al, N8CX, suggested there were 56 check-ins. More than ever.

Parliamentary Committee - Bob, W8RET. Doing well, "no rules broken."

Club Property - Tom, W1PDI was not present. Carl advised posting club members' QSL cards on the bulletin board at hamfest was Tom's, W1PDI idea. Carl brought

the bulletin board to the meeting. He scans the cards and puts them on the website. Dave, KY8OSU said Tom, W1PDI is establishing climate-controlled storage for club property.

Repeaters - Carl, W8KRF. Carl started to discuss work he'd done on the repeaters in the last couple of weeks when Tom, W1PDI arrived and introduced himself. No club property report. Newsletter - March 27 is the deadline to submit items to the newsletter.

Old Business - Winter Hamfest. 180 attended. Heard report from Tom, W8KYZ earlier in the meeting.

New Business - The Board discussed future hamfests at the recent meeting. More members need to help. The Board discussed ways to get more participation. Involvement is needed if we are to grow. Suggestions: Helpers sign up for two-hour assignment and get in free. They would not be eligible for a prize. Commit to two hours. Helpers would get a T-Shirt with NOARS logo and indication of involvement in the event. The Summer Hamfest is coming up. An audience member mentioned AARL has some nice pamphlets about this. We need this for young people. It's more than talking to people. We need an elevator speech. Tom, W1PDI suggested we create a white paper with bullet points. A motion was made to adjourn the meeting by AI, N8CX, seconded by Bill, K8RTR. The motion passed. The meeting was adjourned at 7:25 PM.
