Below is information sent by Carl. W8KRF in an email.

What do I need to participate in a zoom meeting?

You will need a computer or device with a webcam and microphone to participate in a Zoom session. If you do not wish to have an account, all you'll need to do to participate is click on the link for the class that your contact will send to you via an email invitation.

Do you have to have a zoom account to join a meeting?

A Zoom account isn't required to attend a meeting. Users do need a Zoom account to host a meeting. ... Anyone can join a meeting using the Zoom mobile apps or desktop applications for Windows and Mac.

Do you need a webcam for zoom?

Do I have to have a webcam to join Zoom? You are not required to have a webcam to join a Zoom group video call. You will not be able to transmit your video. You will continue to be able to listen to video calling and view any screen sharing.

How long is a free Zoom meeting?

With the free version of Zoom, users can hold an unlimited number of meetings, but group meetings with multiple participants are capped at 40 minutes in length, and meeting can't be recorded.

The Right Tool for the Right Job

My grandfather worked as a machinist at a factory that primarily made galvanized pipe. In my early teens he would tell me many times, “the right tool for the right job,” as he showed me how to use many tools. I have always had problems soldering UHF connectors to coax cable, but in 2016 I discovered crimp on connectors thanks to [Jim, W6LG Youtube channel](#). He coincidentally had a little online store that sold the tools and connectors. I had a 60% success rate using his tools and connectors, better than my previous solder jobs, but still I used up almost two connectors for every one that worked. During the COVID-19 shutdown I started playing around with electronics again and bought more test equipment. I needed test cables with UHF, BNC and N connectors on them. I checked out DX Engineering’s custom cable service; it starts to add up when you want 10 different custom cables. While I was on their web site I discovered [DX Engineering new coax cable prep tools for crimp on connectors](#).



They also sell Amphenol crimp connectors. When the new tools showed up, I made 5 test cables using DXE-8X coax with UHF, BNC and N connectors. I only had one failure out of the 10 connections, and that was all my fault, so I now have a 90% success rate using the new tools on the first try.



The DX Engineering documentation on using the tools and what connectors and cables are compatible is particularly good. You will also need a crimp tool. I already had one from DX Engineering from a few years ago.



If you are interested in switching to crimp connectors, I recommend you give the DX Engineering tools a look.

Long-Lost U.S. Military Satellite Found by Amateur Radio Operator

There are more than 2,000 active satellites orbiting Earth. At the end of their useful lives, many will simply burn up as they reenter the atmosphere. But some will continue circling as "zombie" satellites — neither alive nor quite dead.

"Most zombie satellites are satellites that are no longer under human control, or have failed to some degree," says Scott Tilley. Tilley, an amateur radio operator living in Canada, has a passion for hunting them down.

In 2018, he found a signal from a NASA probe called IMAGE that the space agency had lost track of in 2005. With Tilley's help, NASA was able to reestablish contact. But he has tracked down zombies even older than IMAGE.

"The oldest one I've seen is Transit 5B-5. And it launched in 1965," he says, referring to a nuclear-powered U.S. Navy navigation satellite that still circles the Earth in a polar orbit, long forgotten by all but a few amateurs interested in hearing it "sing" as it passes overhead.

Recently, Tilley got interested in a communications satellite he thought might still be alive — or at least among the living dead. LES-5, built by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's Lincoln Laboratory, was launched in 1967.

Tilley was inspired by another amateur who in 2016 had found LES-1, an earlier satellite built by the same lab. What was intriguing to him about LES-5 was that if it was still working, it might be the oldest functioning satellite still in geostationary orbit.

By scouring the Internet, he found a paper describing the radio frequency that LES-5, an experimental military UHF communications satellite, should be operating on — if it was still alive. So he decided to have a look.

"This required the building of an antenna, erecting a new structure to support it. Pre-amps, filters, stuff that takes time to gather and put all together," he says. "When you have a family and a busy business, you don't really have a lot of time for that," he says. But then came the COVID-19 pandemic.

British Columbia, where Tilley lives, was on lockdown. Like many of us, suddenly Tilley had time on his hands. He used it to look for LES-5, and on March 24, he hit the ham radio equivalent of pay dirt.

"The reason this one is kind of intriguing is its telemetry beacon is still operating," Tilley says.

In other words, says Tilley, even though the satellite was supposed to shut down in 1972, it's still going. As long as the solar panels are in the sun, the satellite's radio continues to operate. Tilley thinks it may even be possible to send commands to the satellite.

The MIT lab that built LES-5 still does a lot of work on classified projects for the military. NPR contacted its news office to ask if someone could say more about LES-5 and whether it really could still receive commands.

But after repeated requests, Lincoln Laboratory finally answered with a "no comment."

It seems that even a 50-year-old zombie satellite might still have secrets.

Repeaters – Carl is not experiencing any difficulty with them. They are working OK. Carl is able to access the repeater with his phone to make necessary changes.

Website – Is working well. Carl displayed the website digitally, to answer any questions. He reviewed where to sign in and the members only section and demonstrated how to access the newsletters.

Membership – Two new members: Dave Novotny, N8RRC, who is in attendance tonight and James Laing, W8MCR. We currently have seventy-eight members.

Field Day – Al, N8CX not in attendance. Carl stated that it looks like we will not have an in-person Field Day. The ARRL suggests that we not have Field Day. Carl is setting himself to be a 1E in his back yard. Go to the ARRL Website for information. Carl is not planning on Field Day unless there is a drastic change with Covid-19, not until there is a vaccine.

Social Committee – Elaine, KC8FOS. Any social events are up in the air right now. It is uncertain when we will be able to have in-person monthly lunches, but continuing with Zoom lunches would be good. Meeting at a park was discussed. We would stay six feet apart while we eat picnic lunches we bring for ourselves. We could use HTs to talk. Some people said they would participate. We will send an email.

Hamfests - Carl. We may not have any for awhile, but it's a little early to make that decision right now. There was a question about having one in the fall. However, we can't just change it since we have a contract with the college (Lorain County Community College.) We will wait until closer to the July hamfest and contact the college to see if they have any restrictions. Later in the meeting, after the Newsletter portion, Ann, KA8ZEP, said LCCC is closed until this fall. Carl said Governor Dewine said no schools are opening this year.

Sunshine – Tom, W8KYZ (Treasurer) sent a donation to Fields United Methodist Church in memory of Dave Kennett. The club send a card to Dave Kennett's wife, Juanita.

VE Team – There is no VE until this all goes away.

Newsletter – Tom, N8FDY. The deadline to submit items to the Log is April 25.

Comments; Chris expressed enjoyment of amateur radio and said he hopes John, his father, can make it to a Zoom meeting. John is laid up with an injured ankle, so couldn't make it today. Dan, W8AJF asked if we can use the club call sign, W8KRG if we operate in our back yard. Carl said no. The ARRL says we all have to be within a thousand feet. If not, we'd be breaking the rules of Field Day. Use your own call and work out of your own
